- I have the correct gear, and am in the right place at the right time



GETTING ALONG - TŪHONO - These habits help develop

- I accept everyone and show tolerance and empathy towards others
- I follow the school rules
- I think first
- I use good manners
- I am honest and fair
- I use positive language
- I keep my hands and feet to myself
- I use correct names



CONFIDENCE MAIA- These habits help

- I accept myself and keep myself and others safe
- I follow cyber safety rules
- I take risks and have an 'I can do it' attitude
- I am independent and take responsibility
- · I am confident and participate
- I set myself goals to achieve my best

SPORT, RECREATION AND PLAY

Sport plays a major part in students' lives and at PNINS our number one aim is to get students **MOVING**.



There is currently a change of focus for sport in New Zealand to address the major issue of students not participating or withdrawing in sport. Schools, parents, coaches and administrators hold the key to addressing the current problems we face.

The emphasis needs to change from NOT only winning but also player development, participating in a range of sports and having fun. At PNINS we have decided to make changes to our sports programme with the primary aim of getting students of this age to be more **ACTIVE**.

PNINS prides itself on the sports we offer and the success we have achieved across the board. The number of Super Sports Banners indicates that we are both successful and able to field teams in each event. However, what we have noticed is that other schools can no longer field teams and the competition is getting less and less, and at times, it is the same students participating in these activities.

We have had a different approach since 2020 by categorising our sports into three different areas, SPORT, RECREATION and PLAY. The 'try a sport' programme aims to provide different experiences for students that are not traditionally offered such as golf, horse riding, surf life saving, mountain biking and quick rip rugby.

The numbers in these sports have skyrocketed with a large number of students signed up for sports already this year. A major increase from previous years.

One of the most successful changes we have made has been the focus on **PLAY**. Most of us growing up would have at some point played Bat down, Rounders, Non Stop cricket and Capture the Flag.

Therefore, we aim to use these games for our inter team competition rather than traditional sports such as hockey, cricket and touch rugby etc. Plus teachers are more able to umpire and referee as the rules are well understood and not so complicated with traditional focused sports.

In summary, our focus at PNINS is to provide experiences that students may not have had before and to get them ACTIVE and develop a love of getting involved in sport.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

- Class Councillors They are a team of students who assist in organising events at PNINS. Each classroom has two Class Councillors representing their class (one Year 8 Boy and one Year 8 Girl). They meet with Mrs Cutts and Mr Jones most weeks. Class Councillors lead the school by example, organise events, are trained peer mediators, and help make life at PNINS better by listening to other students' ideas and incorporating these into the school.
- Cultural Councillor This role embraces all the components of a class councillor and enables various cultures the opportunity to hear their voices and to ensure that their views and cultures are heard when having an input into the various decisions made at school involving students. This was been introduced in 2019 and has been an extremely popular role for year 8 students
- Sports Leader Another new leadership role
 that has been implemented recently to enable
 students in this sports field to shine through both
 performance and their role as an administrator.
 They take up many roles and have a large logistical
 participation in organizing school events within our
 school and across schools.
- Co Chair Persons These are the two pinnacle positions within this school for two students. They have a large role to play in representing the school at various events with senior staff at a variety of community events. They are also very visible within school assemblies leading these weekly. A lot of mana is associated with this position and the process is rigors culminating with an interview and the Principal


On Friday 22 March we will celebrate our student leaders - Class and Cultural Councillors - whānau are welcome to come and join us, from 2.10pm.

INTERNATIONAL LANGUAGES

As part of our opportunity framework here at PNINS, we are offering again this year a range of international languages that students can try out.

Learn some language skills and culture of the language that you choose. These are; Mandarin Chinese, French, Japanese, German and Spanish.

The cost to enrol for a language is \$140.00 which when spread out over 20 one hour long classes during terms 2 and 3 is exceptional value for money. Check the school website with parents/caregivers for the days of each language and enrolment procedure.

Why learn an international language? (you may ask yourself). There are a multitude of winning reasons to start learning a language, but you may want to visit countries that speak your learned language and engage with the locals in their mother tongue (or when they visit us here!)

It opens up a whole new outlook and world of exciting possibilities. Think about if you wish to one day travel, study and work overseas in another country, another language, another culture, huge satisfaction. See and understand a culture better from their perspective! Wow!
