SCHOOL ORGANISATION

Palmerston North Intermediate Normal (PNINS) is a two-year, co-educational school catering for students aged 11-13 years. While numbers vary from year to year we usually enrol approximately 700 students. Classes are composite with Year 7 and 8 students learning together. Each Class is part of a team with 3 to 4 other Classes. These teams build strong culture within the school.

As well as providing quality academic programmes, we place special emphasis on the provision of cultural, social and physical programmes. We provide high quality specialist teaching programmes in: Foods and Soft Materials

Technology, DigiTechnology, Kaupapa Māori, Structures and Mechanisms, Hard Materials, Music, Drama, Visual Arts and Science. The development of our four passport destinations and the Five Keys to Success are important parts of the programme.

Palmerston North Intermediate Normal School is trialing a number of innovative practices in order to meet the needs of our students. These include two learning areas with a flexible learning curriculum designed to provide experiences where students have greater ownership and organisation of their learning.

SCHOOL CREST AND MOTTO

At PNINS, we place great importance on our past, our present, and our future. We believe that our motto and our crest honour where we have come from, celebrate where we are now, and welcome where we are headed.

Our school motto is 'Haere Ake Ra', meaning: 'Onwards and Upwards'. This motto was suggested by historian James Cowan in 1940, and is worn by our school with pride.

Our school crest reflects the special character, culture, and uniqueness of PNINS.

Our crest is made up of the lamp and the wave. The lamp symbolises knowledge, and the lighting up of the path of learning. The wave represents the Manawatū River; a landmark that is very important to both Palmerston North and the Rangitāne Iwi.



TEAM ORGANISATION

At PNINS we have six teaching teams:













Students will be placed within a team for their time here at PNINS. The team will reflect a full range of abilities and interests. Students in each team are grouped into home-room classes.



Learning Enhancement

Children who may need additional assistance can include:

- · Children with learning difficulties
- Children with social and behavioural problems
- · Children with intellectual disabilities
- Children with physical disabilities and medical conditions

The Special Education Needs Coordinator (SENCO) assists in facilitating individual programmes to meet the special educational needs of students. Where appropriate an IEP, Statement of Intent, Care or Action Plan will be written for any student receiving additional 1:1 support. This is a prerequisite for students receiving Ministry of Education funding, or funding from outside agencies.

Teacher aides will assist identified students in their classrooms where appropriate, or, where it is beneficial to do so, may withdraw students for 1:1 or small group tuition.

Learning Support Programmes

This group of students is catered for both within the classroom setting, and through involvement in one of our learning hubs.

These programmes will alter from year to year to meet the priority needs of students enrolled. These programmes focus on Literacy and Numeracy.

An ESOL teacher is employed to provide English learning support to any student for whom English is their second language.

Gifted and Talented Students

The learning needs of our gifted and talented students are met through their involvement in a variety of programmes - in the classroom, in withdrawal programmes and through involvement in special programmes, competitions and events held in our wider school community.

Our goal is to challenge all students to achieve at the highest level possible in a caring and supportive environment.

SPECIALIST PROGRAMMES - NGĀ MĀTANGA



Music

The school's music programme offers a number of opportunities for students to develop and extend their talents. The aim of our school music programme is to expose students of all musical abilities to a range of musical experiences, in an attempt to extend their musical knowledge. The school places great emphasis on enabling and encouraging all students to perform to an audience.



Technology

Technology at Palmerston North Intermediate Normal School focuses on the aims outlined in the Technology Curriculum Document. These aims include; Technological Knowledge and Understanding, Technological Capability, and Technology and Society.

At PNINS, we teach at the level of the individual child, and allow for extension and personal growth as the child develops. Our technology programmes at PNINS allow for learning opportunities in the following areas of technology; Production & Process Technology, Electronics & Control Technology, Food Technology, Structures & Mechanisms, Hard Materials Technology, Soft Materials Technology.



Kaupapa Māori

In Kaupapa Māori students get an insight into Te Ao Māori. (The Māori world). We will provide a wide range of learning opportunities to learn te reo and the associated tikanga that sits alongside the relevant experiences. These will include, pepeha, waiata, mahi toi, takaro kemu and the opportunity to learn in and outside the classroom alongside community members. The aim of this programme is for students to learn about the rich history of Aotearoa, respecting the past and preparing them for the future. Haere ake ra!



Visual Arts

Visual Arts is one of four disciplines within the New Zealand Arts Curriculum. Students will apply their knowledge of elements and principles to make objects and images, and will generate and develop visual ideas in response to a variety of motivations. They will do so using imagination, observation, and conventions with materials. Emphasis is also placed on their interpretation of ideas - both of their own, and of others' work.




Science

The school's specialist science programme aims to give all students an opportunity to work in a laboratory environment - exploring science within the context of the Material and Physical World. These lessons take place in our science lab, where we strongly emphasise the correct use of existing safety procedures.



Digitech

Students learn about technological systems (mechanical, electrical, digital and smart) and how they impact our society. Students take on roles within a TV organisation and work together in small production teams to research and develop an outcome for a current problem. Their findings will be communicated using various Black Box systems to produce a TV program informing viewers on their findings.



Citizenship

Among the many principles, values and key competencies outlined in The New Zealand Curriculum, are 'Participating and contributing', and 'Community and participation'. At PNINS, our citizenship education is embedded in these two principles.

Citizenship is not taught as a separate subject, but is integrated into several curriculum areas - with social sciences being the key learning area. Our focus is on how people can participate in the world as critical, active, informed and responsible citizens.

Young people also develop understandings about their roles as citizens through a number of activities and experiences that take place in

and outside the classroom or school. At PNINS, citizenship is all of this and more. It's about the 'PNINS Way'.

It's about having pride in yourself and your school. It's about doing what is right, and looking out for one another. It's about not bowing to peer pressure, and mastering the Five Keys to School Success.

It's also about wearing the school uniform correctly, being a responsible citizen, and caring for the school and the local community.

The Citizenship Blue Badge/Star Incentive Awards recognise student achievements in citizenship at PNINS.





Student Voice

Student Voice is the individual and collective perspectives and actions of our young people, within the context of learning and education.

This includes active or passive participation, knowledge, voting, wisdom, beliefs, service, opinions, leadership, and ideas.

Student Voice reflects identity, and comes from a person's experiences, ideals, and knowledge.

Student Voice can be engaged in numerous ways within classrooms and schools. It allows students to share who they are, what they believe, and why they believe. They are enabled and encouraged to share this with their peers, parents, teachers, and their school.

Sports Leaders

Students are selected from each team to lead their teams and the school with leadership in sport.



School Council

Early in Term 1, each class elects a male and female class councillor. These elected students will represent their class on the school council.

Class Councillors will then be invited to apply for leadership positions within the school council.

Each class holds regular class meetings. These are led by the class councillors. At these meetings, students are able to identify areas for improvement, and propose implementation strategies. Developments arising from class ideas include ideas such as; lunchtime BBQ tables and additional lunch seating, Blue Badges, an inter–challenge playground, our 'Thinking of Others at Christmas' project, and the Year 8 Graduation Dance.

The councillors are also responsible for briefing their Classes on upcoming School Council organised events.

Cultural Council

The Cultural Council is formed from students across the school. This group provides a platform for students' cultural perspectives to be heard and used in decision making processes. They are given opportunities to develop new cultural programmes, activities and/or initiatives that will celebrate the unique cultures within our school.

PERFORMING ARTS PROGRAMME

In the area of Performing Arts, your child will be given many opportunities to engage and excel.

Our aim is to enable your child to sample a wide range of activities within this field, and to encourage those who may wish to continue their involvement in various arts programmes in the future.

We believe our Performing Arts Programme is extensive and advanced enough to be an outstanding point of difference for our school.

The Performing Arts Groups Programme runs for the majority of the school year.

- Pasifika


Members of these groups come together to practise each Friday. As numbers are limited, we hold auditions in Term 1 of each school year.

Our Performing Arts groups are given many opportunities to perform throughout the year, including:

- School Assemblies
- Performing Arts Showcase
- Arts Exchanges
- Super Arts competitions

Our Orchestra, Choir, and Kapa Haka group perform at our School Prize-Giving. The Kapa Haka group, under the direction of skilled Māori Tutors, participates in our Hui a Te Reo Festival. The group is an integral part of other formal school occasions - for example, during the powhiri.

Our Pasifika cultural group is also given the opportunity to perform - one occasion being at Pasifika Fusion.





School Production

The school production occurs on alternate years, providing all students with the opportunity to view and appreciate the talent of others.

The Performing Arts Showcase involves all students in performing arts groups, while the school production includes those who successfully audition in Term 2. Being part of the production is a commitment - with rehearsals for the production taking place after school and during weekends.

Assemblies

Assemblies are a long-standing tradition, and are a great way to celebrate our students. These assemblies may have an academic, sporting, or performing arts focus, and parents and friends are invited to attend. The assembly calendar also features Blue Badge Award assemblies, and Ngā Mātanga Award assemblies. Principal Awards of Excellence will be presented to individuals or teams who display an outstanding level of achievement in one of the five dimensions of learning. Often, special guests are invited to perform, deliver presentations, or present special awards.

Our own Performing Arts groups will also perform at these assemblies, and details outlining the upcoming performances and assembly starting times will be featured in our newsletters, school facebook and on our website.



MĀORI EDUCATION KETE

The special place of Māori in our school community is recognised and valued through Kapa Haka, Māori language inclusiveness, cultural EOTC involvement and a place-based curriculum.

PNINS recognises and values the unique position of Māori in New Zealand and the importance of the treaty partnership.

An ongoing focus for staff at PNINS is around culturally responsive practice and teachers' relationships. Engagement with their learners, their whānau and iwi is highly valued.

We foster a strong Māori whānau group through regular hui ensuring that Māori students, their parents and their whānau participate in and contribute to an engaging and enjoyable educational journey here at PNINS that recognises and celebrates their unique identity, language and culture

As a school we acknowledge and respect the values, traditions, culture, language and history of Māori particularly that of Rangitāne O Manawatū, the recognised Tangata Whenua Iwi of Manawatū and Palmerston North Intermediate Normal School.





PASIFIKA LEARNING FALE

At PNINS we see Pasifika culture as a fale - a traditional Samoan, Niuean, Tokelauan or Fijian house. The fale is a place where people come together to talanoa (to share stories, build empathy, and make wise decisions) and to eat and share with one another.

Respect

Our motto for Pasifika learning at PNINS is; RESPECT.

RESPECT is an initiative that brings together a collective impact model for academic achievement - for both Pasifika learners and educators at PNINS.

The Pacific cultural values that form the basis of RESPECT are the commonalities shared by most Pacific cultures, whereby the poles of the fale are interdependent. When one pole falls, the fale is no longer strong. Therefore, ongoing monitoring and maintenance must be conducted to ensure the poles remain sturdy.

The PNINS Annual Plan uses RESPECT to metaphorically illustrate the intention to strive for Pasifika Excellence within our school.

Education

When it comes to opening doors of opportunities for our Pasifika learners - education is critical.

In the fale, education is one of the four poles that reach up from the foundations to support the roof.

PNINS aims to create a learning environment that encourages leadership and strives for excellence.

Educational Objectives:

- To build a learning environment that creates opportunities for Pasifika learners
- To build on Pasifika students' strengths to enable them to realise their potential

Relationships

Relationships are another foundation of the fale, and are pertinent to the success of this plan.

Through the building of mutually respectful relationships, a learning environment - conducive

to Pasifika learners at PNINS - can and will be achieved.

Pasifika parents, families, and caregivers, Pasifika communities, Pasifika Education groups, and both internal and external stakeholders all have a valued role to play in the building of these relationships.

Service

Hair

GENERAL INFORMATION

School Hours

School hours are Monday to Friday, 8.45am to 3.10pm.

Children are permitted in the school grounds from 8.15am. All children should be at school no later than 8.35am, to allow enough time to prepare for class before the final bell.

Absences

If your child is going to be absent, we ask that you, as parents and caregivers, please ring the school by 9.15am, at the latest or use the school app. This must be done every day that your child is absent.

When your child returns to school, they must bring a signed note or send an email to their classroom teacher, confirming their absence. Students who show a pattern of absence or lateness without good reason may be referred to the Attendance Service.

Stationery Packs

The school has negotiated with a major school stationery supplier to purchase student stationery packs. These packs will include all stationery items that the student will need to start the school year.

School stationery packs will be distributed to students on the first day of the school year. Prompt payment for these items will be appreciated. Stationery packs \$35.00

Lunches

SUBWAY lunches are available every Thursday and Friday. You can order either online or in store (The Square or Albert Street). These are delivered to school at 1pm on these days.

BYOD

Palmerston North Intermediate Normal School's vision is to innovatively blend the use of technology into current programmes, while adapting current practice to include the use of devices.

The school's blended learning approach is one that encompasses both the accessible, diverse and dynamic learning opportunities that is reflected in ongoing IT development but also retains and refines the traditional aspects to learning (pen & paper) that students will require at High School and beyond.

Cell Phones

Students are not permitted to have cell phones in the classroom or in the playground. In exceptional cases where the student needs to make contact with a parent/caregiver after school, the student may bring a cell phone to school provided the following conditions are met:

- The permission form available on the website is filled out specifying the reason for the student bringing the cell phone to school.
- 2. The cell phone is given to their class teacher before 8.45am and collected at 3.10pm.

Children not following correct procedures will have their cell phone taken off them and their parents will be required to collect the phone from the school office at the end of term.

Please note that students can use the school phone in an emergency to call landlines. No electronic devices, such as, iPods, electronic games or cameras are to be brought to school.

Bus

The safety and comfort of everyone on the bus is paramount to our school. It is very important that students travelling by bus behave appropriately and consider others at all times.

All students eligible for travel on a school bus will be allocated a bus pass (complete form on website).

The general rule is that your child must attend the closest school with Year 7 and 8 teaching facilities. If your child lives more than 3.2 km from school, and no alternative public transport is available, they may then be eligible for full transport assistance.

Our School Expectations apply to students on their way to and from school whether they walk, bike or travel by bus.

Cyclists & Scooters

Cyclists are expected to know and follow the 'Rules of the Road'.

By law, all cyclists must wear cycle helmets. It is also a school requirement that all cyclists in school uniform must wear a fluorescent cycle vest.

Students can scooter to school. Cycle and scooter stands are available in a lock up area. It is important that all cyclists use this area, and that all cycles/scooters are locked when in this vicinity. Students must walk their bikes and scooters when on the school grounds at all times.

School Camp

PNINS students attend school camp in Rotorua biannually, in teams spread throughout the year. 2024 is a non camp year so students who are new to PNINS in 2024 will enjoy their camp experience during their second year. Due to the location, the facilities, the length of stay at camp, the significant size of our school and the payment contribution requested (approximately \$500) this option has worked well for our staff and kura and gives whānau appropriate notification to establish a payment plan as well as give students the opportunity to participate in fundraising opportunities.

Tui Ridge is a camp that offers lots of opportunities for students to try activities that they may have never tried before and to challenge themselves to give things a go in a safe, supportive environment.

School Donation/Activity Fee


